

A Worship Study Guide for Individuals, Groups and Families for the week of January 16, 2022

Oaths

This week, Pastor Steve Shelby preached from <u>Matthew 5:33-37</u>

³³ "Again you have heard that it was said to those of old, 'You shall not swear falsely, but shall perform to the Lord what you have sworn.' ³⁴ But I say to you, Do not take an oath at all, either by heaven, for it is the throne of God, ³⁵ or by the earth, for it is his footstool, or by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. ³⁶ And do not take an oath by your head, for you cannot make one hair white or black. ³⁷ Let what you say be simply 'Yes' or 'No'; anything more than this comes from evil.

- Think about a promise you have broken. What happened after you broke the promise? How do you think about the making of that promise today?
- In this part of the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus is referencing the Law of Moses and "false swearing". Read <u>Leviticus 19:12</u>, <u>Numbers 30:2</u>, and <u>Deuteronomy 23:21</u>. What is the core problem with "false swearing"?
- Later in Matthew, Jesus expresses contempt for elaborate oath formulas. Read <u>Matthew 23:16-22</u>. Jesus uses some strong language—why does he call these leaders "blind fools" (17)?
- People invoke all sorts of things, other than God, in making an oath. Jesus mentions "heaven", "earth", and "Jerusalem" as examples (34-35). Why would someone invoke these sorts of things in an oath? How does Jesus use <u>Isaiah 66:1</u> to show that practices like this "come from evil" (37)?
- Does Jesus teaching mean, for example, that Christians should refuse to testify under oath in a court of law?
- What is Jesus' point in verse 36? What is He saying about God? About you?
- Why are oaths unnecessary for the followers of Jesus Christ?
- The One teaching here always speaks the truth and keeps His promises. In fact, He is the Truth and the fulfillment of all God's Promises. How does the faithfulness of Jesus Christ encourage and strengthen you to "let what you say be simply 'Yes' or 'No' (37)"?
- **Pray together** in light of this week's passage.
