

A Worship Study Guide for Individuals, Groups and Families for the week of May 8, 2022

Beware of False Prophets

Youth Director Isaiah Thomas preached from Matthew 7:15-20

¹⁵ "Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly are ravenous wolves. ¹⁶ You will recognize them by their fruits. Are grapes gathered from thornbushes, or figs from thistles? ¹⁷ So, every healthy tree bears good fruit, but the diseased tree bears bad fruit. ¹⁸ A healthy tree cannot bear bad fruit, nor can a diseased tree bear good fruit. ¹⁹ Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. ²⁰ Thus you will recognize them by their fruits.

- Can you share about a time you fell for a false message?
- For Jesus, who is a "false prophet"? (15)
- What metaphor does Jesus use to illustrate dealing with false prophets (15)? What does that word picture communicate?
- The Bible has a great deal to say about false prophets. Read <u>Jeremiah 14:13-16</u>, <u>23:16</u>, <u>Ezekiel 22:27</u> to learn more about what would come to mind to those listening to Jesus' sermon for the first time. Why are false prophets so dangerous?
- How do we know whether a prophet is false or true?
- Jesus' teaching about false prophets comes immediately after his discussion of wide & narrow gates (<u>Matthew 7:13-14</u>). How are these **teachings related**?
- What about people makes us so vulnerable to trusting false prophets?
- Next week, we'll spend more time in this same passage with a focus on vv.16-20. Jesus saw Himself as having a prophetic ministry (<u>Luke 4:24</u>) and the people understood Him as such (<u>John 6:14</u>). However, it is important to note that the One teaching here is God's Final Word (<u>Hebrews 1:1-4</u>), and the Word made flesh (<u>John 1:14</u>). How would you sum up the message God declares through the Person and Work of Jesus Christ?
- Repent and pray together in light of this week's passage.
