

A Worship Study Guide for Individuals, Groups & Families

November 13, 2022: Eternal Life

- In every worship service, we sing songs to God that help us better understand the sermon. This week, we sang "Come Behold the Wondrous Mystery." Listen to the song or read the lyrics. This hymn helps us reflect on the means by which we are given eternal life. After listening to this song, how would you summarize what we believe regarding Jesus Christ that brings eternal life to those who trust Him?
- This week, we heard from <u>Hayes Wilks</u> who shared how Jesus met him, just as He met with Nicodemus. Hayes told us that Jesus met him during a season of suffering and uncertainly, and Hayes was given the gift of eternal life. Think about your story. How have you known suffering and uncertainty? Is there a way Jesus met you in those hard times to lead you to trust Him?
- In every worship service, we read an Old Testament passage that is a companion to the New Testament sermon text. This week we read <u>Isaiah 25:6-9</u>. In Isaiah's vision, what things are distinctive about eternal life?
- Sunday, the congregation sang a Children's Blessing over the young worshippers of WEPC. <u>Listen</u> to the blessing or <u>read</u> <u>the lyrics</u>. What blessing are we seeking in this song? What does it mean for death's power to be undone?
- This past Sunday, WEPC enjoyed a special focus on the youth of our church. Consider reaching out to one our high-school of middle school members to encourage them with a way you see the Lord at work. Take time to pray for our youth, their families, and for all who minister alongside them.
- This week, Pastor Isaiah Thomas preached from <u>John 3:16-21</u>.
 What does Jesus mean by "eternal life"? What is unique about this kind of life?
- Pray that hearts at WEPC will be made new. Ask Him for faith
 to believe that He so loved the world, that He gave His only Son,
 that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal
 life. Do you need to become a Christian? Be renewed as a
 follower of Jesus? To change, believe, or to repent? Hint: The
 answer is "Yes" and you can ask Jesus to meet you right now!
