Luke 3:7-18 What Then Shall We Do?

This week, Steve Shelby preached on <u>Luke 3:7-18</u>.

- Advent & Christmas are the beginning notes of the symphony of destruction God is bringing to sin. And if it is to sin, then
 it is also to sadness and if to sadness then to death.
- "And he [John the Baptist], went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins." (<u>Luke 3:3</u>)
- This connects to <u>Luke 1:16-17</u>, "And he will turn many of the children of Israel to the Lord their God, and he will go before
 him in the spirit and power of Elijah, to turn the hearts of the fathers to the children, and the disobedient to the wisdom of
 the just, to make ready for the Lord a people prepared."
- This is radical for Jewish people. That is why he calls out their tendency to rely on their genetics.
- Baptism was generally for Gentile proselytes.
- By calling the crowds "brood of vipers" (7), John the Baptist is telling them who their true "father" is (8).
- The axe is laid at the "root' of the trees" (9). Winnowing and burning (17).
- So, stop relying on their origin or activity but on the mercy of God.
- "So with many other exhortations he preached good news to the people" (18)?
 - o It is good news that God can raise up sons of Abraham from stones (8)
 - o It is great news to be warned: Fire is coming (16)... "who warned you?" (7)
 - It is great news to be set free from the allure of money and power.
 - But also sex: "But Herod..." (Luke 3:19)
 - o It is good news to "multitudes", tax collectors and soldiers. Who can hate when you have so much in common and so much to repent over?
- We cannot remain as we are.
