Like a Tree

This week, Steve Shelby preached on Psalm 1.

Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers;
but his delight is in the law of the LORD, and on his law he meditates day and night.

³ He is like a tree planted by streams of water that yields its fruit in its season, and its leaf does not wither.

In all that he does, he prospers.

⁴ The wicked are not so, but are like chaff that the wind drives away.

⁵ Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous;

⁶ for the LORD knows the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked will perish.

Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening Robert Frost

Whose woods these are I think I know. His house is in the village though; He will not see me stopping here To watch his woods fill up with snow.

My little horse must think it queer To stop without a farmhouse near Between the woods and frozen lake The darkest evening of the year.

He gives his harness bells a shake To ask if there is some mistake. The only other sound's the sweep Of easy wind and downy flake.

The woods are lovely, dark and deep, But I have promises to keep, And miles to go before I sleep, And miles to go before I sleep.

- With beautiful imagery and great simplicity, Psalm 1 makes a poetic argument. This argument consists in at least these points:
 - o There are really only two ways to live, therefore the Psalm writer only sees two kinds of people.
 - To illustrate this the Psalm writer compares a tree fruitful and well-watered tree with dead chaff.
 - Those who are like trees will have life, a life known and protected by God ending in beautiful communion with him and his
 congregation. The wicked are not so.
- Now, you may have a number of reactions to this:
 - o YES!
 - I don't agree
 - o This seems contrary to grace and the Gospel and seems to indicate an undue emphasis on my will, my actions
 - 1. The righteous person knows their need and day in and day out has an eye toward the fact that there is a God who created him, who loves him and who redeems him.
 - 2. The righteous person did not come to this conclusion on their own. They are like a tree "planted". They are the objects of special care.
 - 3. Being situated by the rivers of water causes the tree to be ever alive. It is an unending source of nourishment and life.
 - 4. Fruitful in season
 - 5. Chaff on the other hand is dead
 - 6. Two completely different destinies
- All of this ultimately comes down to taking God at His Word
