"I Am Coming Soon"

This week, Steve Shelby preached on Revelation 22:12-14, 16-17, 20-21

- ¹² "Behold, I am coming soon, bringing my recompense with me, to repay each one for what he has done. ¹³ I am the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end." ¹⁴ Blessed are those who wash their robes, so that they may have the right to the tree of life and that they may enter the city by the gates....
- ¹⁶ "I, Jesus, have sent my angel to testify to you about these things for the churches. I am the root and the descendant of David, the bright morning star." ¹⁷ The Spirit and the Bride say, "Come." And let the one who hears say, "Come." And let the one who is thirsty come; let the one who desires take the water of life without price....
- 20 He who testifies to these things says, "Surely I am coming soon." Amen. Come, Lord Jesus! ²¹ The grace of the Lord Jesus be with all. Amen.
- For most of us the Biblical promise that Jesus Himself gives (12a, "Behold, I am coming soon") is rarely in our hearts and minds. Certainly, the thought that Jesus is coming to judge the living and the dead, those living in the cemetery and those only visiting, seems archaic, too Old Testament, remote and frankly, a little scary:"...bringing my recompense with me to repay each one for what he has done" (12b).
- This is magnified by the next phrase, "Blessed are those who wash their robes, so that they may have the right to the tree of life and that they may enter the city by the gates" (14)
- I think three things keep us from the eager anticipation of glory: Our own judgmentalism, our own comfort, and our own lack of assurance that our robes have been washed.
 - Judgmentalism: I am eager to point out that that thing or person over there needs to be judged and set right, without equal desire to see myself set right.
 - Comfort: Do you have, as C.S. Lewis wrote, "a desire which no natural happiness will satisfy"? Do you feel like you are on the wrong side of the door to another world? These words are written to sufferers.
 - Lack of Assurance: Judgment and recompense and the great rectifying work of Jesus ought to scare you if you are not washed.
 Judgment cost Jesus His life.
- This keeps us from crying out with these closing words of the Bible, "Come, Lord Jesus" (20)
- Just as it took the coming of Christ into our world and our flesh to redeem us, it will take the second coming of Christ to not just push back the darkness but to eradicate it.
- Until that time, we play hopeful and joyful whack-a-mole. If it takes the apocalypse to eradicate the darkness, why do anything?
- "And we have the prophetic word more fully confirmed, to which you will do well to pay attention as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts" (II Peter 1:19). We do things in faith and obedience to Jesus that point to Him and the glorious future He will bring about.
- "In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed" (I Corinthians 15:52)
- "Behold, he is coming with the clouds, and every eye will see him, even those who pierced him" (<u>Revelation 1:7</u>).
- "Every knee shall bow and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:10-11).
- The impossible will come to pass.
